Understanding Two-Factor Authentication (2FA) and Why It's Important

In today's digital world, keeping our online accounts safe is more important than ever. One simple way to protect yourself is by using **Two-Factor Authentication (2FA)** also known as **Multifactor Authentication (MFA)**.

What is 2FA?

2FA is an extra layer of security that helps prevent hackers from accessing your accounts. Instead of just using a password, 2FA asks for a second piece of information to confirm it's really you.

Think of it like locking your front door. Your password is the key, but 2FA adds a second lock, like a deadbolt, making it much harder for an intruder to get in.

How Does 2FA Work?

When you sign into an account with your password, 2FA will ask for a second form of identification.

This could be:

- ⇒ A special code sent to your phone or email.
- ⇒ A fingerprint scan.
- ⇒ A code from an app like Google Authenticator.

Even if someone steals your password, they won't be able to access your account without this second step.

Why Should I Use 2FA?

Using 2FA makes it much harder for hackers to break into your accounts. Many services—like email, banking, and social media—offer 2FA to keep you safe. Taking this small step can **protect your money**, **identity**, **and personal information**.

How to Set Up 2FA

Setting up 2FA is easier than you think:

- 1. **Go to your account settings** on your bank/credit card etc. website or app.
- 2. Look for "Security" or "Two-Factor Authentication."
- 3. **Follow the instructions** to add your phone number or set up an authentication app.
- 4. Repeat these steps for each bank/credit card account you have.

If you need help, don't hesitate to ask a trusted friend or family member.

Conclusion

Two-factor authentication might sound complicated, but it's really just a way to add an extra layer of safety to your accounts. It's a smart habit to get into, helping you keep your personal information secure. With just a few extra steps, you can make your online accounts much safer! $Page\ 2$

"Portrait of a Lady Frances Deering Wentworth"

Patriot's Day, April 19th of this year, marks the 250th anniversary of the Battle of Lexington & Concord, the start of the American Revolution. For this issue of the Center of Gravity Gazette I wish to share with you the

story of Frances Deering Wentworth, who at the time of the Revolution was the wife of New Hampshire's very last Royal Governor.

If my editor can't read my handwriting, I'll spell the lady's name for her. It's "Frances" as in "Francestown," "Deering" as in "Deering, New Hampshire," and "Wentworth" as in "Wentworth, New Hampshire" – all three towns were named after Frances and her family!

The painting of Frances, which now hangs in a museum in Bentonville, Arkansas, is formally known as the "Portrait of Mrs. Theodore Atkinson Jr." and I'll explain why in a moment. The artist was John Singleton Copley, who painted Frances when she was twenty years old. Unfortunately, history does not record the name of the pet squirrel you see on the tabletop.

Frances Deering Wentworth (1745–1813) was born in Boston to a wealthy merchant and his wife. At the age of 16 she fell in love with John Wentworth, who was her first cousin and the nephew of New Hampshire's Governor Benning Wentworth. Alas, John seemed more interested in business and politics than in Frances, so she got herself engaged to another first cousin, Theodore Atkinson Jr., to get John's attention. John promptly sailed to England without her, so Frances was stuck with Theodore, who later commissioned the Copley portrait of his wife and her squirrel for their Portsmouth home.

When John returned to New Hampshire as the new Royal Governor, succeeding his unpopular uncle, it was apparent to Frances that she'd married the wrong first cousin. Fortunately for her, if not for her first husband, Theodore Atkinson died young of consumption. After a respectful

mourning period of two weeks, the young widow married Governor John. Their first child was born seven months later. People did have calendars and could do arithmetic in 18th-century New Hampshire, and the Wentworths' haste did not go without notice.

John Wentworth was an effective Royal Governor who did his best to reduce tensions after the Boston Tea Party, but revolutionary fervor made it necessary for John and Frances to flee New Hampshire two months after the Battle of Lexington & Concord. When the war ended they sailed to Halifax in Nova Scotia, where John became the Surveyor General of the King's Woods, a job which involved long absences from his wife.

Lady Frances, who'd enjoyed an active social life in London, was not at all happy in Halifax, which you'll understand if you've visited that quiet town. Also, she was lonely without her husband. Therefore it was only natural that she became quite friendly with King George's son William, who visited Halifax more than once while serving in the Royal Navy. The Prince was 21 and Frances was 41, but she was as beautiful as ever. John Wentworth made his displeasure known to the King, and Prince William was sent to Quebec.

John became Governor of Nova Scotia, was knighted, and received a baronetcy.

Frances died in England at the age of 68. John died in Halifax seven years later. They had at least one child together; John had another son with his mistress.

Senior Lunch at NBCS is on Thursdays that school is in session. Seniors play Bingo at noon in the Recreation Office after lunch.



In January 2025, the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission notified the Town that the current program through Manchester Transit Authority (MTA) will end on June 30, 2025. This program was originally voted on in 2019 to provide once a week van services to include rides to medical appointments, shopping, and other events.

New Boston is presently covered up to 25 trips per month with Section 5310 funding where the cost is subsidized. Providing trips above and beyond that 25 trip per month cap is proving challenging for MTA due to the distance from Manchester. This Pilot Program was spearheaded by Susan Carr and has served the Town well for the past few years.

Participation in the program has grown significantly since 2020.



The Pilot program of these rides was designed to demonstrate the demand in the Town so we would be equipped with actual figures we could use in planning a long-term approach.

The Select Board is looking at options to continue this program and Susan Carr is once again assisting the Town with developing options after the current program ends in June of 2025. In the proposed CY 2025 budget there is \$11,232 requested for this program, an increase from \$9,036. If the proposed CY 2025 budget passes, in addition to the funds available for rides, there will be a Police Vehicle coming out of the rotation that could be repurposed as a Senior Services vehicle and the funds allocated in the proposed budget could be used for expenses for that vehicle, paying for drivers, and other expense to keep and even enhance this program. For seniors who need mobility options beyond that vehicle, the existing Recreation Department bus could augment the service since it is equipped with a wheelchair lift.

The Select Board will be reviewing options and ideas on how to best continue this service starting in July.

Close Encounters of the New Boston Kind by Jerel Speck

"Space isn't remote at all. It's only an hour's drive away if your car could go straight upwards." – Fred Hoyle, quoted in The Observer

In the advent of the mysterious drone sightings across the country, people have begun watching the skies again, with some folks starting to wonder if they really are alone in the universe. And who can really blame them, as spotting unidentified flying objects in the mid-20th Century became somewhat of a cultural pastime for most. With the interrupted journey of Betty and Barney Hill in 1961,

and the incident in Exeter four years later, New Hampshire seemingly became the alien destination of choice for a brief moment.

That's not to say that New Boston didn't have its fair share of visits of little green men.

For example, the redacted files of Project Blue Book, a military group formed to study the reports of UFOs (now called UAPs – unidentified anomalous phenomena,) had a civilian case from New Boston, which consisted of a stationary object that was red and soft white in color. The alleged craft would eventually head south by southeast, after having been watched by the witness for thirty minutes. Taking place on August 20, 1956, it was simply dismissed as being astronomical in origin, possibly the planet Mars appearing through thick clouds.

Nearly a decade later, my father would have his own unusual experience with what he believed to be a space-ship. While on a date, he supposedly saw a silver blimp-shaped entity, with all kinds of colors emanating from within its skin. Although they never officially reported it to the proper authorities, the speculation of what exactly happened in that vehicle was debated in front of Dodge's Store for many years after.

On a more serious note, there is the account of a former New Boston resident's experience with a presumed UFO (sorry... UAP) on November 2, 1973. Lyndia Morel was driving home through Goffstown when she spotted a bright object following her car. After the ensuing chase, it would be witnessed by a local family, who initially helped the frightened young woman, a police officer, and by happenstance, Morel's husband, Bob.

Her ordeal would appear on the front of The Union Leader the next day, and Lyndia would meet with Betty Hill in Portsmouth to compare their stories. Despite the events that unfolded, the Morels remained remarkably grounded, and still have a lot of affection for our community. I had the pleasure to interview both of them, almost eight years ago, and remain in Facebook contact with the couple.

And with that, Lyndia Morel is probably the most famous person from New Boston to ever have a close encounter with the third kind. But that was over fifty years ago. So, the real question is... are these space invaders even showing up in our little hamlet nowadays?

Well, if there is any doubt that aliens are currently among us, one should look no further than the town's recycling center. You can actually find one such fellow, working by the cardboard baler. If anything, this only further proves that everybody needs a second job, as they make their way around the cosmos.
